

Pupil Premium Expenditure 2016-17

Pupil Premium is a specific allocation of funds, additional to main school funding which the government believes is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children.

The government believes that the allocation of Pupil Premium will tackle disadvantage by reaching the pupils who need it the most; Looked After children, those eligible for Free School Meals, Forces children.

In 2016-17, Redmile was allocated £15680. Below are details of how it was spent and the impact it had on the children at our school.

Cost	Provision	Impact
£8300 Targeted intervention by class teacher and LSA	Targeted intervention by each class teacher/LSA to enable focused intervention and support for vulnerable and disadvantaged pupils, especially in those cohorts where there are PP children, for reading, writing and maths, to address gaps in learning.	Met pupil's individual needs and closed the gap in reading, writing and maths. Pupils gain confidence and make good progress from their starting points, e.g. pupils to understand deeper learning so it is transferred into other areas of the curriculum. Younger children achieved much in their first year, particularly in terms of social and emotional developments which was the main priority for support.
£2520 Outdoor Learning	Outdoor learning scheme and opportunities developed to enable Pupil Premium pupils to enhance learning and make links in the curriculum.	Pupils increased confidence and engaged in all activities and enjoyed the sessions. They found patterns connections in outdoor and more formal learning by making real life connections in the curriculum.
£885 School visits and activities/extra-curricular activities	To support school visits and activities asking for voluntary financial contributions from parents, including trips such as residentials and activities like swimming. Financial support was also given for extra-curricular activities, including those offered by other clubs or providers outside of school. This has included, for example, drumming lessons and Magical Maths.	Pupil's learning was enriched and their self-confidence grew. This funding also boosts health and fitness which subsequently boosts attainment. Subsidies of this kind ensure no child misses out of such important aspects of education.

£216 Resources	Targeted resources for pupils to support and aid learning in literacy and maths	Pupils engaged quickly in maths and literacy and were able to access resources on hand and work in additional sessions in the day as appropriate for individuals and groups.
£2340 Dance scheme and sessions	Dance sessions to enhance the curriculum so children can maximize their wider skills	Increased opportunities for Pupil Premium children to attend events due to difficulties with transport (the rural setting of our catchment means parents have to drive children many miles to access sports and clubs outside of school). Our children represent the school in shows and perform in concerts/assemblies so they gain confidence and have a sense of achievement.
£370 Outside agencies	Financing support from outside agencies to help children with specific identified needs.	Helped to minimise risk of underachievement due to emotional/ health/well-being/social/academic factors
£145 Daily milk	Purchase of daily milk for Pupil Premium children	Supported nutrition and promoted good health.
£873 Ukelele lessons	KS2 pupils learnt to play a musical instrument and had the opportunity to perform with others to an audience.	Enabled pupils to maximise opportunities to learn new skills/instrument to enhance their learning and aspirations and deepen learning
£97 Individual resources	Specific resources for vulnerable families	Helped pupils and families wellbeing and welfare
